Britton mentors Le'Mia and the other teens who participate in BGC's "Be Great: Graduate" program.

Britton has helped Le'Mia get back on track academically. They have focused on time management, study skills, and test prep. As a result, Le'Mia feels confident at school, and is once again earning straight As! Le'Mia loves to share her success with Britton – she calls her first when grades come out – but more importantly, Le'Mia feels safe confiding in her when life gets tough. Even though they're focused on school, Le'Mia has found a trusted ally in Britton, who helps her maneuver all of life's challenges.

Le'Mia intends to stick with the Be Great: Graduate program, which will culminate with her high school graduation in 2022. The time she has left in the program, and with Britton, may be limited, but the lessons they have taught each other are for life. Of Britton, Le'Mia says "I'm going to keep everything she's ever told me with me."

While she has considered following in her mom's footsteps and becoming a nurse, Le'Mia currently plans to pursue a business degree. She has an eye for fashion and hopes to one day turn this passion into a career as a fashion buyer.
