At Great Rivers United Way, our mission is rooted in the belief that we achieve more when we work together. Because of your unwavering support in 2024, we expanded our reach, strengthened our partnerships, and deepened our commitment to addressing our communities' most pressing needs.

We secured several key grants, enabling us to go beyond our annual Community Investment campaign and fund even more initiatives that create lasting impact. One of our biggest priorities is mental wellbeing, a need clearly identified in the 2024 Compass Report. This focus led to an expanded partnership with the Mental Health Coalition of La Crosse, ensuring that the vital work of Diana DiazGranados and Better Together continues.

Recognizing the importance of strong nonprofit leadership, we started Learn to Lead, a board training series designed to equip community members with the skills needed to drive meaningful change. The program was a resounding success, and we're excited to continue it in 2025, with our second cohort wrapping up on March 4.

In honor of GRUW's 75th anniversary, we invited donors to increase their gifts to or by \$75. We were overwhelmed by your generosity – so many of you stepped up, reinforcing just how much this community cares about making a difference. We also found novel ways to engage with friends new and old in 2024. Our Diamond Heist Mystery Dinner was a major success, bringing supporters together for an evening of fun and mystery while raising critical funds. We're excited to bring this event back in October 2025 – get ready to put on your legwarmers and grab your hairspray for a night in the '80s, like totally!

Meanwhile, imPACKs, our new kit-packing program, connected businesses partners with meaningful volunteer opportunities. More than 3,400 kits featuring much-needed supplies were assembled and gifted to local nonprofits in 2024, and we're set to eclipse that total in Q1 2025.

At the core of all we do is our Community Investment grant program, which ensures that vital services remain strong across our service area. By strategically directing campaign dollars to high-impact initiatives, like mental wellbeing and basic needs, we continue to support programs that address our region's most pressing needs as identified by the Compass Report.

Even as we navigate uncertainties in federal funding, GRUW remains steadfast in its mission to unite people and resources to improve lives and strengthen our communities. Thank you for being a part of this journey. Together, we are making a difference.

COMMUNITY NEEDS

The Compass Report community needs assessment is a joint effort between Great Rivers United Way, area healthcare organizations, and county health departments to improve the quality of life for everyone in our region. The most recent iteration of the report, which focuses on six of the seven counties Great Rivers United Way serves, was released in June.



Eighty-three percent of Coulee Region residents who completed the 2024 Compass Survey reported being "very" or "moderately" concerned about mental health. National, state, and local data suggest the problem is large and far-reaching.

GRUW'S RESPONSE

Since 1949, Great Rivers United Way has united people and resources to find solutions to our community's most pressing challenges. We take a comprehensive approach – listening via the Compass Report and responding via Community Investment grants, programming, and partnerships – to our region's top needs.

After months of research and conversation with our Board of Directors, committee members, and other key stakeholders, in the spring of 2024, Great Rivers United Way finalized a new strategic direction that would further focus our funding and align our funding cycles with the Compass Report. The 2024 report made it clear that mental health was a top concern and mental wellbeing should be Great Rivers United Way's focus.

Your gift to Great Rivers United Way supports local resources that foster mental wellbeing so all members of our community can thrive. Your gift also supports basic needs – food, shelter, and safety – that provide a solid foundation upon which individuals and families can first become stable and then begin to focus on their mental wellbeing.

Your gift to our 2024-25 campaign is already helping address basic needs. Our first mental wellbeing grant cycle will begin in February 2025.

SUPPORTING MENTAL WELLBEING

Projects end, but the work continues...

Better Together in La Crosse County, an eight-year initiative funded by the Advancing a Healthier Wisconsin (AHW) Endowment beginning in 2016, came to an end in 2024. Better Together aimed to reduce youth depression risk by strengthening protective factors that build resilience.

Better Together focused on three key strategies:



Project Impact

- 2,500+ youth gained practical skills for mental well-being
- 3,500 adults learned to recognize and respond to mental health challenges
- 2,500 community members engaged in learning about childhood trauma and healing
- 85%+ of school staff trained in Youth Mental Health First Aid

MENTAL HEALTH COALITION

Better Together made significant strides in building youth resilience and strengthening mental health support, but the work is not done. Too many young people struggle in silence. Now is the time to build on Better Together's successes and push even further to create a community where every member has the support they need to thrive. Part of Great Rivers United Way's ongoing commitment to mental wellbeing is not letting this work – and the person heading it up – go.

Better Together Project Director Diana DiazGranados will remain a member of the Great Rivers United Way team, in a new role called Community Wellbeing Director. Additional grant funding and a new partnership with the Mental Health Coalition of Greater La Crosse ensure this critical work continues, keeping mental health and mental wellbeing a priority in our community.

EARLY LITERACY INITIATIVES

READ TO SUCCESS

Great Rivers United Way is supporting young learners by matching them with Read to Success volunteer tutors in classrooms throughout our service region.

Seventy-four Read to Success tutors were trained and mentored 175 third graders in 15 school buildings in seven school districts over the course of 2024. Tutors meet weekly with students to focus extra time and attention on reading.

Studies show that when students are behind in grade-level reading at the end of third grade, they almost never catch up. This is an important opportunity to make a positive impact at a key time in a child's life. Great Rivers United Way works closely with our local schools to ensure this valuable program continues to connect caring adults and children to lift up reading skills.

If you consider one hour of tutoring weekly for eight months at an hourly rate of \$20/hour, Read to Success is a \$22,240 investment in our community.



IMAGINATION LIBRARY

Great Rivers United Way offers early childhood program Dolly Parton's Imagination Library to families living in Crawford and Grant counties. Imagination Library is designed to help families with young children develop a love of books and reading. After a free and easy registration process, Imagination Library mails children ages birth to five a new book every month.

In 2024, 5,737 books were mailed to 485 local children thanks to this program funded by Great Rivers United Way.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

FOOD DRIVES

Great Rivers United Way was instrumental in the success of two food drives in 2024.

The 32nd Annual National Association of Letter Carriers' Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive took place in May. GRUW has helped with promotion and volunteer recruitment for this even for many years. In 2024, 31,300 pounds of food and hygiene items were collected.

NALC Branch 59 in La Crosse is receiving Great Rivers United Way's 2024 Community Partner award for this joint effort.

GRUW's partnership with Rotary Lights La Crosse continued in 2024. GRUW leveraged our local business connections to organize out-of-park community food drives with 23 corporate partners.

While results for Rotary Lights' 30th Anniversary year are still pending, based on previous years, we anticipate these community food drives generated approximately 25,000 additional items.

> In October, Trane Technologies employees packed 300 hygiene kits that partners the REACH Center and Family Promise of Monroe County distributed to community members experiencing homelessness.

IMPACKS

Great Rivers United Way launched imPACKS, its newest community engagement initiative, in 2024. This kit-packing program helps our business partners meet their corporate social responsibility goals.

Five imPACKs events were held in -2024:

- Three corporate partners participated: Hydrite (2), Trust Point, and Trane Technologies (2)
- 2,700 snack packs, 600 hygiene kits, and 100 backpacks with school supplies were assembled by volunteers
- Six nonprofit partners and hundreds of children and people experiencing homelessness benefited

LEARN TO LEAD

Great Rivers United Way hosted its first cohort of its new Learn To Lead board training program in late summer 2024. Learn To Lead was designed to empower individuals interested in serving on a nonprofit board of directors by building leadership skills and knowledge of board operations.

The program has successfully equipped two dozen participants with the tools and confidence to make a difference for a cause they care about.

For Great Rivers HUB, 2024 was another year of growth, as work continued in all four counties the HUB serves, including ongoing expansion in rural counties.

The Pathways Community HUB model has allowed us to provide significant infrastructure and sustainability support for the Community Health Worker (CHW) programs in partnership with Great Rivers HUB. In 2024, CHW partners earned a total of \$355.650 in reimbursements through the model. That amount was split between the four counties Great Rivers HUB serves, with La Crosse County receiving \$149,250 and a total of \$206,160 going to our rural counties (Jackson, Monroe, and Crawford). This doesn't include the grant dollars Great Rivers HUB provided to partners to support the startup or ongoing support of CHW positions.

Leverage Community Health Workers

A Community Health Worker is a frontline public health worker who is a trusted member of and/or has an unusually close understanding of the community served. This trusting relationship enables the worker to serve as a liaison/link/intermediary between health/social services and the community to facilitate access to services and improve the quality and cultural competence of service delivery.

In 2024, CHWs helped:

- House 64 individuals/families
- 54 individuals find and maintain employment
- 54 individuals/families become food secure
- Establish mental health care for 21 individuals
- Provided 2,100 one on one health education sessions
- Support 21 mothers to have a healthy birth
- 45 individuals establish a primary care provider
- Navigate services to address 1,427 basic needs

ALEXIS DE TOCQUEVILLE SOCIETY

French aristocrat Alexis Charles-Henri Clerel de Tocqueville was 26 when he came to America in 1831. His travels took him all over the young nation as a keen observer of American society. Perhaps his most important observation was that Americans helped each other in times of need. He recognized, applauded and immortalized the voluntary spirit that lives in America's heart. He wrote: "we as Americans ask for the cooperation of his fellow citizens, it is seldom refused; and I have often seen it afforded spontaneously and with great good will."

The United Way Tocqueville Society was formed in March of 1984 to deepen individual understanding of, commitment to, and support of United Way's work: advancing the common good by creating opportunities for a better life for all. The Tocqueville Society recognizes local philanthropic leaders and volunteer champions around the world who have devoted time, talent, and funds to create long-lasting changes by tackling our communities' most serious issues.

Membership in the Tocqueville Society is granted to individuals who contribute at least \$10,000 annually to a member United Way.


